It's something man made that replaces a natural part of your body. In the case of Straumann® Pro Arch, it's a set of multiple artificial teeth that take the place of missing or damaged natural teeth.

If you're going to have a tooth replaced, the best you can do is replace it with something that mimics a natural tooth as closely as possible. Only dental implants replace the entire tooth structure, including the root and crown. As a result, dental implants look and feel like natural teeth, and help prevent and minimize bone loss while preserving surrounding teeth.

Straumann® Pro Arch implant-supported dentures are removable by your dentist for maintenance.

Your natural-looking teeth are fixed to dental implants with tiny screws and are secure as your natural teeth. This is a permanent solution, but your dentist can remove them periodically for cleaning and maintenance.

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Here's a quick look at the process.

1 Exam and Planning

Your dentist provides a thorough exam and talks over the treatment options that best fit your condition and needs.

2 Surgery and Temporary Placement

Implants are placed and an impression is taken to plan for your permanent prosthesis. A temporary arch may also be placed.

3 Final Impression

After healing, an impression is made for your final prosthesis. When complete, the prosthesis will be secured to the implants in your mouth.

4 Restoring Your Smile

Your final prosthesis is secured to your implants and the fit and feel are adjusted as needed.

How to Take Care of Your New Smile

- Your dentist will remove it for maintenance, but you should not do it yourself.
- Between regular check-ups, you should brush and care for your prosthesis just as you would with your natural teeth
- Your dentist will also provide detailed instructions for care

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If you have inadequate bone volume and /or quality, local root remnants, serious internal medical problems, uncontrolled bleeding disorders, inadequate wound healing capacity, not completed maxillary and mandibular growth, poor general state of health, drug or alcohol abuse, psychoses, pro-longed therapy-resistant functional disorders, xerostomia, weakened immune system, illnesses requiring periodic use of steroids, uncontrollable endocrine disorders, bruxism and other parafunctional habits, these conditions might present a risk for you. Consult your clinician to find out if dental implants are right for you. The possibility of a minimally invasive procedure and receiving your new teeth on the day of surgery depends on many factors, such as bone presence and quality, dental history, implant location, and implant stability. Your clinician will fully describe the possible scenarios to you during consultation prior to surgery.
